Key themes:

- Complexity

Overarching messages:

- The complex and cumulative nature of neglect, often in the context of poverty.
- The risk of harm to adolescents, which may be hidden and hard to recognise. There is a need to develop a better understanding of the social and environmental context of the risks and harm adolescents face outside of the family.
- The need to focus on thorough assessments and clear plans.

Adolescents:

- Adolescents' early experiences may contribute to feelings of worthlessness and lack of self-efficacy in adolescence
- Gaining understanding of an adolescent's early years, current and changing family situations and wider social networks
- Children who have experienced trauma are not quickly made safe
- Practitioners should consider complex and contextual safeguarding

Neglect and Poverty:

- It is important not to ignore the impacts of poverty, but also not simplistically to attribute the family's problems to economic hardship alone
- · Risk of becoming desensitized
- Need to use clear language
- Pre-birth assessments
- Role of fathers
- Taking into account concerns by neighbours and anonymous referrals
- Combined chronologies
- Assessments of kinship placements.
